## Recycle skip

The subject of placing recycle bins in the Oyster Bay area over the summer period was raised at the AGM. Contact was made with the Marlborough District Council and further information was sent to them on request. There is to be a discussion in Council during July and August regarding the expansion of the recycling system. Our request will be a part of that discussion.

# **Submissions on proposed Marlborough Environment Plan**

## **Natural Character**

This topic was covered in the AGM minutes in the last newsletter but briefly, the Association requested a closer study of various areas of Port Underwood as it had not received a detailed analysis in the past in terms of natural character. Some areas subsequently have received an in-depth study and the Association has recommended several other areas within the Port for additional review.

# **Transport and Signage**

The Association supports maintaining amenity values in rural and urban areas by encouraging the use of national and arterial routes by high volumes of through traffic and heavy vehicles and discouraging high volumes of through traffic and heavy vehicle use of collector routes and local routes. Viable alternative routes and methods of transportation should be used whenever possible.

The Association provided a list of criteria by which the appropriateness of using certain local roads by heavy vehicles could be determined at the Resource Consent stage of an operation.

We also advocated the establishment of a user-friendly method of reporting traffic accidents and near misses that would not normally trigger a police report. This will create more realistic data on road incidences and lead to safer roads for all users.

# **Oyster Bay fuel jetty**

It was reported that Port Marlborough was reviewing the repair or removal of the fuelling jetty at Oyster Bay, possibly moving the fuelling gear onto the main wharf. There are concerns about how this would affect the local operators. Port Marlborough has been made aware that local concerns should be a part of the decision-making process.

#### Mussel farm extension

A resource consent application has been lodged to extend a mussel farm near Deep Bight on the western side of the Tongue. The Association has submitted against the application on the basis that it is a non-complying activity which extends significantly into the western arm of Port Underwood and the application does not sufficiently address the cumulative effects on the marine habitat, visual aspects, recreational use, other commercial users, and navigation.

#### Rodent control

An email was circulated to the members inquiring about problems with rodents and methods of control. Below is a summary of the responses.

## Reduce the rat attracting environment

Don't leave anything around that a rodent would be attracted to as a food source. Use sealed containers for items such as pet food, grass seed, etc. They even like bags of blood & bone. Clear away from your buildings those warm, dry little places that would make good nesting sites.

# Reduce the rodent access into your buildings

Keep your doors closed. Trim back overhanging tree branches that could be used as access routes to your roof.

Check your buildings for access points such as the holes where pipes and cables enter the building. If the hole is larger than the pipe fill in the excess space with course steel wool. The rodents do not like to chew through that.

To prevent rodents entering the roofing cavity, check your roofing over hang and block off the gaps between the roofing and the bargeboard that the roofing sits on. An effective but somewhat tedious method is to cut some wire mesh to the profile of the roofing and attach it to the bargeboard fitting tightly up into the roofing ridges. This still allows air ventilation to circulate in the roof area. Also make sure that the edges of the ridge cap and side flashings are down tight. If rodents are chewing through the wood a strip of galvanized bracing strap can be nailed to the wood.

# Eliminating rodents from the area

The natural way – get a cat. Electronic devices to drive rodents away. There seems to be mixed results with these. Some people have had good success and others have found them of little use. It seems that you want to use at least 4 of them to cover the whole house area.

Otherwise trapping and poisoning. There is always the standard mouse and rat trap but good placement is required to be on the rodent's pathway and prevent harming other animals. Other traps can be purchased from the Picton Dawn Chorus group.

www.pictondawnchorus.nz phone 021 247 3712. They supply wooden box traps from \$10 up to Goodnature self-resetting traps for \$160. A range of traps can also be purchased from Goodnature www.goodnature.co.nz.

Poison bait blocks can be purchased at a number of outlets. Bait stations to prevent access from other animals and birds can also be purchased. It is simple to make your own bait station. Use a 500mm length of pipe around 60mm to 80mm diameter. Use 2 pieces of bendable tie wire. Form a loop in one end of each wire. Thread the bait blocks onto one wire. Pointing the wires in opposite directions, pass the straight end of each wire through the loop of the other wire and pull tight capturing the bait block between the loops of the wires. Insert the wires and bait into the pipe until the bait is centred in the pipe. Bend the excess wire over the end of the pipe and this will hold the bait in the centre of the pipe. Most people seem to use at least 5 or 6 bait stations or more around their buildings.

The general consensus is that rodent control is an on-going job and will cost you for bait or traps. The variety of pest will change from time to time. Recently mice seem to be more of a problem than rats.

## Marlborough Long Term Plan 2018 – 2028

The Port Underwood Association made a submission on the Long Term plan. We highlighted that very few of the listed activities were going to have direct benefit to the Port Underwood area.

In regards to infrastructure investment and particularly roading, we pointed out that levels of service and performance measures were listed for paved roads but not for unpaved roads. While acknowledging the planned forecast of expenditure for unsealed roads, the Port Underwood Association is concerned that without prescribed levels of service and performance measures, effectiveness cannot be measured and the ability to maintain an expected level of quality on our roads will be hampered. Therefore, we submit that levels of service and performance measures for unsealed roads must be included in the Marlborough Long Term Plan 2018-2028.

The Association supports increased environmental studies and actions based on those studies but to date there has been very little environmental study by MDC in the Port Underwood area and none of the proposed environmental projects in this plan include the Port Underwood area. We encourage the inclusion of Port Underwood in future studies.

We support a review to establish a fairer rating system however a new system must have credible analysis of the weightings for various sectors. In this instance we do not support the decrease of the weighting of the commercial/industrial sector for Economic Development funding as this decreases rates charges on the direct beneficiaries of the developments and increases the charges on others who may incur a negative effect from some developments.

#### Roads

It has continued being difficult for Marlborough Roads and HEB, the contractors, to keep the roads clear given the adverse weather. They have continued to make significant efforts to keep the roads open. In particular, the culvert near the Whites Bay turnoff has been replaced and several slips have been cleared. One large slip at Ocean Bay caused the closure of the road for a week. The road edge has also failed in some areas and one (at least) has been repaired. The work undertaken to keep the road open, or to re-open it, has been appreciated.

The roads are, however, still dangerous at times. In the past 18 months nine cars have fallen/slipped off the edge of the road, including one of the contractor's utes (and recovered by their excavator). Also, one of the wooden 'crash' barriers above Robin Hood Bay has been smashed, presumably by a car running into it. As most residents know, the clay is very slippery when wet, the gravel does not aid braking and the edge of the road is often hidden by vegetation. Given the large drops at the side of the road, there is a concern that there will be a serious accident rather than just bent metal and damaged pride.

It is also apparent that the proposed work to replace the small bridge in Robin Hood Bay is now in progress as a small diversion to the side of the bridge has been constructed.
